The Executive Council is the administrative branch of the Franklin Student Association. NATIONAL AND COMMERCIAL HONOR SOCIETIES

In 1900 the National Honor Society was founded by Dr. Wm. Owen in Chicago. In 1922 Rochester inaugurated the society at Monroe High School. When Benjamin Franklin was opened in 1931, a chapter was begun here. Membership is based on service to the school, leadership, character, and scholarship. Candidates must be in the upper third of the eleventh or twelfth grades. The Franklin chapter is sponsored by Mrs. Hall and Mrs. Wondergem.

The Commercial Honor Society originated at Benjamin Franklin in 1931. To become eligible students must receive the favorable vote of every commercial teacher; must have completed two years of commercial work other than typing; have no mark below C on the permanent record card; and 75% of all marks must be A or B. After the inception of the Alpha Chapter at Franklin, other chapters followed: Beta at Charlotte High, Gamma at Madison, Delta at Niagara Falls, and Eosilon at Fulton. Each term the advisers change. Miss Batz and Mr. Leggett are in charge at present.



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


